



"ABOVE ALL ELSE TEACH THE TRUTH: THE POWER OF PLACE AND THE IMPORTANCE OF LOCAL HISTORY"

DR. HASAN KWAME JEFFRIES



2024 Robert M. Taylor Memorial Lecture

Hasan Kwame Jeffries teaches, researches, and writes about the African American experience from a historical perspective.

He has chronicled the civil rights movement in the ten-episode Audible Originals series "Great Figures of the Civil Rights Movement," and has told the remarkable story of the original Black Panther Party in Bloody Lowndes: Civil Rights and Black Power in Alabama's Black Belt, which has been praised as "the book historians of the black freedom movement have been waiting for."

Hasan has collaborated on several public history projects, including serving as the lead scholar and primary scriptwriter for the \$27 million redesign of the National Civil Rights Museum at the Lorraine Hotel in Memphis, Tennessee, the site of the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. He currently serves as the chairperson of the Board of Directors of The Montpelier Foundation, which stewards the Virginia estate of James Madison, the fourth president of the United States and the architect of the Constitution.

Hasan regularly shares his expertise on African American history and contemporary Black politics through public lectures, op-eds, and interviews with print, radio, and television news outlets, including the New York Times, Washington Post, Los Angeles Times, NPR, CNN, and MSNBC.

He has also contributed to several documentary film projects as an historical advisor and featured on-camera scholar, including the 2023 documentaries Fight the Power: How Hip Hop Changed the World (PBS) and Lowndes County and the Road to Black Power (NBC/Peacock). And his 2020 TEDx Talk "Why we must confront the painful parts of US history" has been viewed more than 2 million times.

For his public history work, the King Arts Center in Columbus, Ohio honored him with a 2023 Legacy and Legends Award.

Hasan's commitment to teaching what he calls "Hard History" led him to edit Understanding and Teaching the Civil Rights Movement, a collection of essays by leading civil rights scholars and teachers that explores how to teach civil rights history accurately and effectively, and to host the podcast "Teaching Hard History," a project of the Southern Poverty Law Center's Learning for Justice division. Hasan also helps school districts develop anti-racist programming and culturally responsive curricular content centered on social studies by conducting professional development workshops for teachers and administrators.

A College of Arts and Sciences Alumni Associate Professor in the Department of History at The Ohio State University, Hasan takes great pride in opening students' minds to new ways of understanding the past and the present. For his pedagogical creativity and effectiveness, he has received numerous awards, including Ohio State's highest commendation for teaching – the Ohio State Alumni Award for Distinguished Teaching.

Born and raised in Brooklyn, New York, Hasan graduated from Morehouse College in 1994 with a BA in history and earned his PhD in American history with a specialization in African American history from Duke University in 2002.

HISTORY OF THE



INDIANA ASSOCIATION HISTORIANS

EXCERPT FROM THE 1995 ANNUAL MEETING PROGRAM:



"Founding: The idea of establishing an organization of state historians surfaced in 1979–1980 as part of the planning for the sesquicentennial of the Indiana Historical Society (IHS). Although the idea did not become a constituent part of the IHS celebration, subsequent discussions, particularly among Emma Lou Thornbrough (Butler University), Gayle Thornbrough (IHS), and Errol Stevens (IHS), led to the calling of an exploratory meeting of interested historians at the Society on May 20, 1980. A steering committee met August 11, 1980, to plan a preliminary organizational meeting of the state's historians. The more than one hundred persons attending this meeting on October 31, 1980, in the auditorium of the State Library and Historical Building in Indianapolis had the privilege of hearing Prof. John Higham (John Hopkins) speak on the subject "Historians and Their Communities Today." On March 13-14, 1981, seventyseven historians from within the state assembled at Purdue University for the first annual meeting of the Indiana Association of Historians. An initial discussion session on Friday night chaired by Clifton J. Phillips was followed on Saturday by three sessions: "Non-Teaching Uses of History"; "Social and Economic Issues in the History of the United States"; and "World Events and Philosophies in a Changing Europe." At the business meeting the historians officially chose to call their nascent organization "Indiana Association of Historians," a name originally suggested by Emma Lou Thornbrough....

AWARDS

BENNETT-TINSLEY AWARD

for Undergraduate History Research and Writing

The Bennett-Tinsley award encourages undergraduate research in a broad range of subjects related to Indiana and rewards excellence in history research and writing. Many areas of the state's past, especially related to the history of women, minorities (including race, ethnicity, and gender/sexuality), refugees, peace and social justice issues, and the environment have received limited attention in Indiana historiography. The purpose of this competition is to recognize students who examine these topics and produce scholarship that advances our knowledge of these understudied areas of Indiana history. The Indiana Historical Bureau (IHB) of the Indiana State Library, coordinates the award in partnership with the Indiana Association of Historians. It is given in honor of Pamela J. Bennett, long-time director of the IHB, and Katherine Tinsley, Manchester University professor, former president of the IAH, and coordinator of the Peggy Siegel Writing Competition, which was the predecessor of this award.

WALTER K. NUGENT

Best Graduate Student Paper Award

The award, presented at the annual IAH conference, is named in honor of Walter K. Nugent. Professor Nugent, a renowned historian of the American West, was the Andrew V. Tackes Professor of History at the University of Notre Dame. He authored eleven book, including *Crossings: The Great Transatlantic Migrations, 1870–1914* (1992) and the acclaimed *Into the West: The Story of Its People* (1999), which won the Caughey Prize of the Western Historical Association, and is considered an ideal example of social-demographic history. In 1981, Professor Nugent, then teaching at IU Bloomington, was elected as the first president of the IAH.

JAMES H. MADISON

Best Indiana Magazine of History Article Award

The award is named in honor of James H. Madison, Thomas and Kathryn Miller Professor of History Emeritus at Indiana University Bloomington. Professor Madison is the dean of Indiana history, as his significant publications have shaped the way we interpret the state and its history. Among his many publications are *Hoosiers: A New History of Indiana* (2016), *Slinging Doughnuts for the Boys: An American Woman in World War II* (2007), and *Lynching in the Heartland: Race and Memory in America* (2001). A long-time member and supporter of the IAH, Professor Madison served as president of the organization in 1991–1992.
