Call for Papers: "Revolutionary Eras: Long Past, Gone Astray, and Still Underway"

45<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference

The 45<sup>th</sup> annual meeting of the Indiana Association of Historians (IAH) will be held **April 4<sup>th</sup>** and 5<sup>th</sup> on the campus of Hanover College in Hanover, Indiana. This year's annual conference theme is "Revolutionary Eras: Long Past, Gone Astray, and Still Underway."

In 2026, the United States will mark the 250<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the American Revolution, a critical opportunity for scholars and the public to reflect on its legacies. Amidst the yearlong celebration of events such as the historic battles at Lexington and Concord, we ask scholars to ask the following question: How did the nation's revolutionary aims shape its citizens and society from past to present? Within Indiana, what persons and groups have fought to widen the scope of the American Revolution to challenge oppression and inequality? Alternatively, how has the memory, commemoration, and perseveration of the American Revolution been employed in the nation's culture wars and political contests from the early republic to our contemporary age?

In that same vein, the IAH also invites scholars to think broadly about the concepts of revolutions. Presenters should consider moments of profound political upheaval, social change, and technological innovation from around the world running the gamut from L'Ouverture's Haitian Revolution to Japanese firms pioneering the robotic age in the late 20<sup>th</sup> century. Lastly, the IAH encourages scholars to think of revolution as a time of epistemic change and shift underscoring how historical events, figures, and issues shattered and remade how humans think about science, gender, sexuality, music, fashion, public health, and higher education.

The IAH invites proposals for papers, panels, roundtables, lightning sessions, and working groups relating to any historical subject. The conference committee welcomes submissions from college and university scholars, K-12 history educators, public historians, librarians and archivists, graduate students, and independent historians. All presenters must be present at the conference. Panels typically consist of three paper presenters, a chair, and an optional discussant. Each presenter should include a single-page paper proposal and an equally short CV.

This year the IAH annual conference will be hosted on the campus of Hanover College located on the Ohio River in southern Indiana.
